VOLUNTEER FORTHE HEALTH OF IT

If you ask any of the approximately 75 members who are volunteer visitors, they will all tell you it is a very rewarding position. Our volunteers donate their time to visit patients at Vancouver General, St. Paul's or Royal Columbian Hospitals because it is an enjoyable experience, especially when the patients and their families inevitably express thanks and gratitude for the opportunity to talk to someone who has experienced what they face. As well, it is very common for hospital staff, including the doctors to emphasize the benefits of a POHA visit.

Unfortunately, as with any organization, we experience a constant turnover. For example, at Royal Columbian, two visitors have recently moved out of the area, another is planning to move, and one has retired for health reasons. In addition, the number of pre admission clinics to be visited has increased from one each week to three. Therefore, we always need more members at all three hospitals to join the ranks of the volunteer visitor.

Nursing Education at RCH

Thank you for this opportunity to discuss the specialized education of the nurses providing care in the Cardiac Surgical Intensive Care Unit (C.S.I.C.U.) and the Telemetry Ward at Royal Columbian Hospital.

Over the last decade nurses are increasingly in demand in this province and indeed throughout the world. Creative recruitment and retention strategies as well as support for education form an integral part of our program.

Undergraduate student nurses are invited to gain clinical experience on our telemetry ward. A program initiated in 2005 has allowed us to hire some of these undergraduate nurses into support positions. Under the supervision of qualified staff nurses, these nurses gain valuable experience and develop an interest in Cardiac Nursing. This spring, our first two undergraduate nurses have completed their training and have been hired into positions in the New Graduate Program.

The New Graduate Program allows newly qualified RN's to work in our specialized area in a reduced capacity. They attend classroom orientation with the Clinical Nurse Educator followed by two to three weeks of on the job training. Once this training is completed the new grad is able to provide patient care with the support of an experienced staff member who supervises advanced skills such as ECG interpretation and care of pacemakers.

After several months working in this capacity, the new grad is sponsored to attend a nine week high acuity specialty course at BCIT. On completion he or she enters a six week orientation which involves both classroom and clinical training before becoming a fully qualified telemetry nurse.

Nurses interested in practicing in the CSICU require a minimum of two years experience. Nursing students from specialty graduate programs are encouraged to gain clinical experience with us mentored by a senior CSICU nurse. Royal Columbian Hospital also sponsors experienced nurses to attend an eleven week critical specialty course at either BCIT or Kwantlen

College. On completion of this course the nurse enters an eight week orientation which includes four to six classroom days and a minimum of twelve 12H supported shifts before practicing independently.

Of course not all of our nurses are new grads! Many come to us with previous experience.. These nurses are individually assessed on hire and are provided with the appropriate educational training. All nurses regardless of experience complete a minimum of four classroom days and eight 12H supported shifts before practicing independently.

Support and learning does not stop when orientation ends. Each new staff member is assigned to a mutually agreed upon mentor who continues to support and encourage the new staff member during their first year of practice. Regular

clinical update days and a variety of educational sessions and workshops are offered both in and out of the hospital throughout the vear. As a result we are confident in our ability to provide and continue to provide the quality of

patient care our cardiac patients have come to expect.

Two members were elected to the Board of Directors at the Annual General Meeting held last February.


