We received some very sad news in May. Don Brown died at an age of 90. He had open-heart surgery about 16 years ago, and joined the POHA in 1996. He was President for two years 1999 and 20012001. Don helped us along, just as many others have in the past. We thank you Don. (see more information on Don Brown on page 3).

In December 2008 we introduced the ActNow/POHA walking program to post operation patients, leaving their hospital. To date we have given out about 110 of these guidelines. ActNow, (www.gov.bc.ca), was set up by the B.C. Government to bring attention to all B.C. residents of the need to exercise through walking. They are willing to provide POHA with pedometers, which we give to selected patients, in order to keep track of the number of steps they take every day. In order to participate in this program, we recommend, once you leave hospital, to contact your doctor to advise him of your intent to start a walking program.

Since December, over 62 post operative patients started walking. Some of these "open-hearters" are still walking and others are in formal work out programs. We recommend that within a couple of months of walking you register in such a program. Our information sheets have phone numbers to contact.

Kelowna General Hospital to Become a New Cardiac Care Centre and Major Teaching Hospital

Kelowna General Hospital, a part of the Interior Health Authority, will expand to become British Columbia's fifth cardiac critical care centre. It will include a complete revascularization program, including open-heart surgery and percutaneous coronary intervention such as angioplasty. These procedures are currently provided for adults at Royal Columbian Hospital, in New Westminster, Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria as well as Vancouver General Hospital and St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver. The fifth site at Kelowna General Hospital will increase capacity for heart services in B.C. In addition, KGH will have expanded angiogram capabilities. Specialized heart services will be brought closer to home for residents of the growing Southern Interior, and trips to the Lower Mainland will be reduced for around 1,600 patients who need advanced cardiac care services. It is expected to be fully operational by the end of 2012. More than 600 cardiac surgeries will be performed each year.

A transitional plan will see operating theaters in the old hospital tower being renovated to create cardiac surgery suites. This will occur after the new patient care tower currently under construction is completed. A new cardiac center building is expected to be completed in 2016 to 2017.

The number of open-heart surgeries in British Columbia last year was 3,397, an increase of approximately 12 percent since 2001. "Currently, KGH is able to perform diagnostic angiograms for cardiac patients, but that is as far as it goes," said Dr. Richard Hooper, cardiologist at KGH, "This expansion will transform Kelowna General Hospital to a full service cardiac centre."

The teaching and research capacity of the expanded hospital in a new medical school building will ensure that the UBC Faculty of Medicine can train more health care professionals for the province.

A very dedicated group of volunteers is already active in the Kelowna area. The Kelowna Coronary Exercise Society (KCES) is affiliated with the Pacific Open Heart Association. A cardiac patient visitation program was formed in 1999 by Bert Webb, under the auspices of Central Okanagan Association for Cardiac Health (COACH). Their major objective is to help lower the anxiety and concerns of patients about to go to the Coast for surgery or other cardiac intervention. John Moxness currently coordinates scheduling and represents the visitation committee on the KCES Board of Directors. Early in 2009, John met with Warren Keep, President of POHA and they agreed to cooperate between RGH and Lower Mainland hospitals to ensure that patients receive a support visit during their trip to a surgery hospital at the Coast.

<u>Don Brown – In Memoriam</u> By Mike Martin



Don Brown, one of Burnaby's most distinguished citizens, passed away on May 16, 2009 at the age of 90 years. Don was president of the Pacific Open Heart Association during 1999 and 2000. He was awarded the Don Topp trophy in 1998. He and his wife Helen were well known supporters at nearly every POHA function for many years.

After serving overseas for five years during the second World War, Don joined the B.C.

Provincial Police in 1947, which was absorbed by the RCMP in 1950. He retired at the rank of superintendent, with the bulk of his service in the forensic laboratories. His specialty was document examination.

He served two years on the City of Burnaby School Board, six years as a councillor, and 10 years as a parks and recreation commissioner. For his efforts, he and Helen jointly received the Citizen of the Year Award in 1992. Don was awarded the city's highest award, Freeman, in 1993. In 2007, the Edmonds community policing office building was named after him.

We extend our sympathy to Helen, his children, seven grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

In recent years the Pacific Open Heart Association do-
