The History of Heart Surgery

In 450 BC, Hippocrates, the father of medicine, wrote, "A wound in the heart is mortal." With few exceptions the heart remained sacred territory, outside the bounds of surgery, for centuries.

The first paper relating to heart surgery was published in 1801 by the Spanish surgeon, Francisco Romero. After making an incision next to the sixth rib he opened the pericardium, or sac around the heart, to drain a five pound build up of fluid. In his memoir Romero stated, "I have established a new medical landmark for posterity in the year 1801."


In 1896, Dr. Ludwig Rehn repaired a stab wound to the right ventricle of a patient's heart, a procedure known as cardiorrhaphy.

Theodore Tuffier, in France, successfully opened a narrowed aortic valve with his finger in 1912.

In 1938, Dr. Robert Gross, a paediatric surgeon, performed the first ligation of a Patent (Open) Ductus Arteriosus, in a 7½ year old girl at Boston's Children's Hospital. The PDA is an artery that abnormally connects the pulmonary artery and the aorta causing blood to be shunted from the left to the right heart which overworks the left ventricle.

In 1946, Clarence Crawford repaired an aortic coarctation, also referred to as narrowing of the aorta. In the same year, closed mitral valvulotomy was reintroduced by Dwight Harken and Charles Bailey. Both surgeons, in separate operations, inserted their index fingers and used a small knife to open the blockage.

Most complex surgeries that are fairly common today would not be possible without the invention and development of the

heart-lung machine. The heart had to continue beating and blood had to circulate through the lungs to be oxygenated. In 1952, John Lewis used systemic hypothermia to reduce heart movement and made it possible to close an atrial septal defect in a five year old girl. In 1954, Walton Lillihei was able to maintain circulation and oxygenation while one of the patient's parents was used as a "heart-lung machine."

Open Heart Surgery (OHS) means the patient is connected to a heart-lung bypass machine to maintain oxygenation and circulation of the blood. The invention of the first prototype heart-lung machine by physician John Gibbon of Philadelphia was an important breakthrough in making OHS possible. The first human operation was performed by Gibbon in 1953.

In 1956, Dr. John Callaghan performed Canada's first open heart surgery at the University of Alberta Hospital. The first successful complete repair of "blue baby" malformation, Tetralogy of Fallot, was a ten-hour procedure repairing a combination of four defects of the heart. In 2014, by an amazing twist of fate, Callaghan's great granddaughter was born with the same malformation. Baby Tate underwent a

two-hour surgery to fix the defect nearly 60 years after her great grandfather performed the first such repair in Canada.

In April, 1957, the first operation using a heart-lung machine was performed in British Columbia at Vancouver General Hospital on an eight year old boy with a hole in the upper chamber of his heart called an atrial septal defect.

In May, 1960, OHS was performed on a twelve year old girl at St. Paul's Hospital. The first Canadian made heart-lung machine was designed and built by Dr. Harold Rice at St. Paul's. The new Children's Hospital opened in Vancouver in July, 1982. At that time the paediatric surgery department moved there.

Currently, Open Heart Surgery is performed in British Columbia at Vancouver General Hospital, St. Paul's Hospital, Children's Hospital, Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria, (1973), Royal Columbian Hospital in New Westminster, (1991), and Kelowna General Hospital (2012). Approximately 900 operations are performed each year at each hospital.

Great strides have been made in the field of heart surgery since Hippocrates' time, the majority in the past 70 years. ♥
